



Training a new generation of leaders in public works

Institute graduates are public works leaders who motivate and create a positive work environment enabling their agencies to fully serve their communities.

The Rocky Mountain Public Works Institute provides a regional program that educates and elevates public works employees, helping them achieve their management and leadership potential through interactive classes taught by experienced public work officials. The Institute follows the proven APWA model that has been successfully implemented by a number of other APWA chapters throughout the country.

Core topics include:

- Supervisory techniques and skills
- Basic management skills
- Communication skills
- Leadership skills
- Community service/customer orientation skills
- Legal understanding
- Fundamentals of government
- Finance
- Resource management skills
- Public works operations
- Creating the future

The 2019 Rocky Mountain Public Works Institute will take place in the Denver metro area with five 2-day sessions held every other month starting in January and concluding with the Annual Chapter Conference in the fall. Tuition will be \$1700 with half due at acceptance into the program and the second half due in the first quarter of 2019 allowing agencies to split costs over two budget years. Tuition includes training, materials, Annual Chapter Conference registration, light breakfast, lunch and snacks for each session.
